

Dear brothers and sisters,

The Fourth Sunday of Lent is known as "Laetare (Rejoice) Sunday," expressing the Church's joy in anticipation of the Resurrection of our Lord. This Sunday's Scripture readings remind us that it is God who both gives us proper vision in body as well as in soul; and warns us that those who assume they see the truth are often blind, while those who acknowledge their blindness are given clear vision. They exhort us to be constantly on our guard against spiritual blindness.

Have you ever played a game with a blindfold? Or, have you ever been on a trust walk, where you are blindfolded and led by another person? Playing games with a blindfold helps us appreciate the gift of sight. Those who have a

problem with their eyesight, whether due to an ocular illness or old age, can appreciate the preciousness of the ability to see, even with the aid of corrective lenses. Through the story about Jesus curing a person born blind, St. John's Gospel presents sight in a spiritual sense. The blind man receives not only the ability to use his eyes but the gift to see the truth. Sometimes a person can look, but not see. The man born blind, the most unlikely person, receives the light of faith in Jesus, while the religion-oriented, law-educated Pharisees remain spiritually blind, unable to see that Jesus was indeed the Messiah. This marvelous story teaches us the necessity of having our eyes opened by faith. Seeing realities as they are, and not as how we assume them to be, enables us to see the truth. It liberates us from our prejudiced presumptions, and gives us true joy when our darkness is turned into light.

Physiologically, the "blind-spot" is the part of our eye where vision is not experienced. It is the spot where the optic nerve enters the eyeball. A blind spot in a vehicle is an area around the vehicle that cannot be directly observed by the driver. In real life, we all have blind-spots—in our relationships, our marriages, our parenting, our work habits, our personalities, and even in our spiritualities. It is very possible for the religious people in our day to be like the Pharisees of old: religious in worship, in frequenting the Sacraments, in prayer-life, in donating to the Church, and in knowledge of the Bible—but blind to the poverty, injustice, brokenness and pain around them. Jesus wants to cure all the blindness that cripples us in life.

This past Monday, March 13, as some of you may know, was the 10th Anniversary of Pope Francis' election to the throne of St. Peter. Ten years ago, I was standing shoulder to shoulder with thousands of other people in St. Peter's Square when the white smoke billowed from the chimney on the top of the Sistine Chapel indicating that a new Pope has been elected. Little did I know that the humble man who seemed to have been a recruit from the periphery would turn out to be such a prophetic and influential leader for our times. In the ten years of his pontificate thus far, Pope Francis has repeatedly pointed out the blind-spots in our Church and in our modern culture. His magisterial teachings have challenged, not only the Catholic faithful, but also everyone else, to recognize and address those blind-spots. From issues concerning the dignity of human life, peace and happiness, to issues concerning the family, morality, marriage, and love, the Pope consistently focuses our attention on each concrete situation; its values and consequences; and the possible paths to address it based on the wisdom of the Christian faith. Preferring to use simple and direct language, he leads us to a clearer vision about God, about ourselves and about others. His prophetic voice is not always heard, for there are always those who refuse to see, but it always commands respect and attention.

Joining my former Vatican colleagues and the throngs of distinguished guests who gathered to honor Pope Francis at the Apostolic Nunciature in Washington, DC this past Monday, I rejoiced knowing that, through the Holy Father, Jesus himself continues the mission of healing in the Church and in the world. Like many religious and government leaders who spoke so highly of the Pope, I was filled with gratitude for the ways in which God has used him to heal our spiritual blindness in so many areas of life, especially through his message of inclusivity, compassion and close accompaniment, so that we can look at others, see them as children of God, and love them as our own brothers and sisters, saved by the death and Resurrection of Christ.

As we enter the fourth week of Lent, I invite you to join me in reflecting on how God has illuminated and cured some of our own spiritual blind-spots in this holy season. Let us give thanks then for the gift of sight, and pray that we may keep moving forward with a clear vision.

Queridos hermanos y hermanas,

El Cuarto Domingo de Cuaresma se conoce como “Domingo Laetare (Regocijo),” expresando el gozo de la Iglesia en anticipación de la Resurrección de nuestro Señor. Las lecturas de este domingo nos recuerdan que es Dios quien nos da la visión adecuada tanto en el cuerpo como en el alma; y nos advierte que aquellos que asumen que ven la verdad a menudo son ciegos, mientras que aquellos que reconocen su ceguera reciben una visión clara. Nos exhortan a estar constantemente en guardia contra la ceguera espiritual.

¿Alguna vez has jugado un juego con los ojos vendados? O, ¿alguna vez has estado en una caminata de confianza, en la que te vendaron los ojos y te guía otra persona? Jugar con los ojos vendados nos ayuda a apreciar el don de la vista. Aquellos que tienen un problema con la vista, ya sea por una enfermedad o por la vejez, pueden apreciar la preciosidad de la capacidad de ver, incluso con la ayuda de lentes correctores. A través de la historia de Jesús curando a una persona ciega de nacimiento, el Evangelio de San Juan presenta la vista en un sentido espiritual. El ciego recibe no solo la habilidad de usar sus ojos sino el don de ver la verdad. A veces una persona puede mirar, pero no ver. El hombre ciego de nacimiento, la persona más improbable, recibe la luz de la fe en Jesús, mientras que los fariseos educados en leyes y la religión permanecen espiritualmente ciegos, incapaces de ver que Jesús era de hecho el Mesías. Esta maravillosa historia nos enseña la necesidad de tener los ojos abiertos por nuestra fe. Ver las realidades como son, y no como asumimos que son, nos permite ver la verdad. Nos libera de nuestras presunciones prejuiciosas y nos da verdadera alegría cuando nuestra oscuridad se convierte en luz.

Fisiológicamente, el “punto ciego” es parte del ojo donde no llega la visión. Es el lugar donde el nervio óptico ingresa al globo ocular. Un punto ciego en un vehículo es un área alrededor del vehículo que el conductor no puede observar directamente. En la vida real, todos tenemos puntos ciegos: en nuestras relaciones, matrimonios, crianza de los hijos, hábitos de trabajo, personalidad e incluso en nuestra espiritualidad. Es muy posible que la gente religiosa de nuestros días sea como los fariseos de antes: religiosos en el culto, en la frequentación de los sacramentos, en la vida de oración, en la donación a la Iglesia y en el conocimiento de la Biblia, pero ciegos a la pobreza, injusticia, y dolor a su alrededor. Jesús quiere curar toda la ceguera que nos paraliza en la vida.


El pasado lunes, 13 de marzo, como algunos de ustedes sabrán, fue el décimo aniversario de la elección del Papa Francisco al trono de San Pedro. Hace diez años, estaba de pie hombro con hombro con miles de otras personas en la Plaza de San Pedro cuando el humo blanco salió de la chimenea en la parte superior de la Capilla Sixtina indicando que se había elegido un nuevo Papa. No sabía que el hombre humilde que parecía haber sido un recluta de la periferia se convertiría en un líder tan profético e influyente para nuestros tiempos. En los diez años de su pontificado hasta el momento, el Papa Francisco ha señalado repetidamente los puntos ciegos en nuestra Iglesia y en nuestra cultura moderna. Sus enseñanzas magisteriales han desafiado, no solo a los fieles Católicos sino también a todos los demás, a reconocer y abordar esos puntos ciegos. Desde las preguntas relativas a la dignidad de la vida humana, la paz y la felicidad, hasta las preguntas relativas a la familia, la moralidad, el matrimonio y el amor, el Papa centra constantemente nuestra atención en cada situación concreta; sus valores y consecuencias; y los caminos posibles para abordarlo desde la sabiduría de la fe Cristiana. Prefiriendo usar un lenguaje sencillo y directo, nos lleva a una visión más clara de Dios, de nosotros mismos y de los demás. Su voz profética no siempre se escucha, porque siempre hay quienes se niegan a ver, pero siempre exige respeto y atención.

Al unirme a mis antiguos colegas del Vaticano y a la multitud de distinguidos invitados que se reunieron para honrar al Papa Francisco en la Nunciatura Apostólica en Washington, DC el pasado lunes, me regocijó saber que, a través del Santo Padre, Jesús mismo continúa la misión de sanar en la Iglesia y en el mundo. Al igual que muchos líderes religiosos y gubernamentales que hablaron tan bien del Papa, me llenó de gratitud por las formas en que Dios lo ha usado para sanar nuestra ceguera espiritual en tantas áreas de la vida, especialmente a través de su mensaje de inclusión, compasión y acompañamiento cercano, para que podamos mirar a los demás, verlos como hijos de Dios, y amarlos como a nuestros propios hermanos y hermanas, salvados por la muerte y resurrección de Cristo.

Al entrar en la cuarta semana de Cuaresma, los invito a unirse a mí para reflexionar sobre cómo Dios ha iluminado y curado algunos de nuestros propios puntos ciegos espirituales en esta temporada santa. Demos gracias entonces por el don de la vista, y oremos para que podamos seguir avanzando con una visión clara.

WHAT CAN I DO TO HELP OUR FAMILY PRACTICE OUR FAITH EACH DAY?

Some families practice their religion together as just another event on their schedule: go to church, observe Lent, help at the parish picnic, go to a meeting, volunteer time, make your confession, use your envelope... But the focus needs to be on who we are-God's people, in relationship with him, loved, forgiven, and redeemed, and called to live and proclaim the Gospel. Our awareness of God's presence and our sense of mission are supported by the daily rituals, celebrations, and traditions that help us stay focused. Sharing our faith strengthens us and clarifies the beliefs and values of Christian living.

FEAST DAY OF SAINT JOSEPH

FIRST FRIDAY EUCHARISTIC ADORA-

Spiritual writers speak of Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament as "the Mass held in contemplation." As a way of encouraging devotion to the Eucharist, we invite all parishioners to come and spend some time before the Real Presence of the Lord on **Friday, April 7, 2023**. Exposition and Adoration will take place right after the 8:00am Mass and will conclude with Solemn Benediction before the start of the 12 Noon Mass.

Daily family practices include time for prayer-before meals, before bed, before important meetings and activities. Attend Sunday Mass together and discuss the homily afterward. Create family celebrations for holy days and holidays. Make religion a regular part of your discussions. Include others, especially the elderly and the less fortunate, in your activities and charitable efforts. By applying the virtues of faith, hope, and love to each day, faith becomes part of who your family is. It influences how you act towards others, what you value, and how mindful of God you are. Faith is the leaven of life that helps all of us rise to our calling and dignity as God's people.

LENTEN REGULATIONS

The penitential and grace-filled Lenten Season begun with Ash Wednesday. It is a time of hope-filled renewal as the Church journeys towards Easter. During Lent, the Church calls us to a deeper spirit of penance, fasting, almsgiving and prayer, "which express conversion in relation to oneself, to God, and to others" (*Catechism of the Catholic Church, nos. 1434 and 1969*). To foster this spirit, the Church reminds us of the following obligations:

Abstinence: Healthy Catholics age 14 and older are required to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday, every Friday of Lent and Good Friday.

Fasting: Healthy adult Catholics age 18-59 inclusive are bound to fast, limiting food to one full meal with minimal food at the other two mealtimes and nothing in between.

Almsgiving: The act of giving to the poor, in the most ancient tradition of the Church, is an expression of penance, a witness of fraternal charity, and an expression of Lenten conversion. Catholics are encouraged to support generously the charitable works of the whole Church through regular stewardship to their parish, support of charities, and their generous response to the diocesan Annual Catholic Appeal.

Those not bound by these regulations, such as young and elderly persons or those who are sick, are encouraged to practice other forms of personal penance and sacrifice.

REGULACIONES DE CUARESMA

La temporada de Cuaresma penitencial comenzó con Miércoles de Ceniza. Es un tiempo de renovación llena de esperanza a medida que la Iglesia camina hacia la Pascua. Durante la Cuaresma, la Iglesia nos llama a un espíritu más profundo de penitencia, ayuno, limosna y oración, "que expresan la conversión en relación con uno mismo, con Dios y con los demás" (*Catecismo de la Iglesia Católica, nos. 1434 y 1969*). Para fomentar este espíritu, la Iglesia nos recuerda las siguientes obligaciones:

Abstinencia: Todos los fieles que han cumplido 14 años de edad deben abstenerse de comer carne el Miércoles de Ceniza y todos los viernes de Cuaresma.

Ayuno: Todos los fieles entre las edades de 18 y 59 inclusive están obligados a ayunar. El ayuno significa limitarse a una comida completa y evitar los alimentos entre comidas. El sustento ligero se puede tomar en otras dos ocasiones durante el día. El café, y el té están permitidos en cualquier momento.

La limosna: El acto de dar a los pobres, en la más antigua tradición de la Iglesia, es expresión de penitencia, testimonio de caridad fraterna y expresión de conversión cuaresmal. Los Católicos son animados a apoyar generosamente las obras caritativas de toda la Iglesia a través sus contribuciones regulares a nuestra parroquia, el apoyo a las organizaciones benéficas y su generosa respuesta a la Campaña Católica Anual.

A los que no están sujetos a estas normas, como los niños, los mayores de edad o los enfermos, se les anima a practicar otras formas de penitencia y sacrificio personal.

This special evening will feature an English and Spanish conference, led by Father Michael Bruno - Retreat Master, Church Historian and Professor at St. Joseph's Seminary in Yonkers, NY, and Father Pedro Lopez - Retreat Master, Director of Divine Mercy Apostolates in the Diocese of Brooklyn.
